

We are pleased to again have the opportunity to appreciate Teddy Roosevelt

Roosevelt steered the United States more actively into world politics. He liked to quote a favorite proverb, "Speak softly and carry a big stick. . . . "

Aware of the strategic need for a shortcut between the Atlantic and Pacific, Roosevelt ensured the construction of the Panama Canal. His corollary to the Monroe Doctrine prevented the establishment of foreign bases in the Caribbean and arrogated the sole right of intervention in Latin America to the United States.

He won the Nobel Peace Prize for mediating the Russo-Japanese War, reached a Gentleman's Agreement on immigration with Japan, and sent the Great White Fleet on a goodwill tour of the world

Some of Theodore Roosevelt's most effective achievements were in conservation. He added enormously to the national forests in the West, reserved lands for public use, and fostered great irrigation projects.

He crusaded endlessly on matters big and small, exciting audiences with his high-pitched voice, jutting jaw, and pounding fist. "The life of strenuous endeavor" was a must for those around him, as he romped with his five younger children and led ambassadors on hikes through Rock Creek Park in Washington, D.C.

There was a gentkeman from England wh came into the valley to promote a mining enterprise and town located three miles South of Coaldale. His name was Noah E, Barnes and he brought his family: wife N,.E, daughters; Ada and May, Fred and Mrs, Fred, and a grandson named Ferd Jr.

The ocupati9on listed for Mr, Barnes was "mine promoter Copper & Gkd:, Owns the land, no mortgage,: His son Fred, was the Mining Cmpany Treasurer,

The village of Barnes City sprung up with dance hall saloon, homes to live in and invuitations to partajke in striking it rich with the mining claims showing excellent gold possibuilities,. The parties promoted by the owners if Barnes City were attended by many of the citizens in the area,

Today there is no trace oif this enterpris,. The homes were built without foundations and only smoothed squares of ground are visible where once a thriving community lived.

Typical promoters who wanted to get rich quick on other people's money, They faded away rather quickly, and the homes were either burned or torn down for their materials. Some were actually moved to other locations in the Valley.

Persolite Products was incorporated in 1949, with Herman Freudenberg as the principal member of Management and Technical Director. As a new company, in an infant industry, it was based on Curtis Street in Denver, Colorado, for eight years.

In 1957, the company moved from the big city to Florence, Colorado, into the plant formerly occupied by Alexander Film, and Great Lakes Carbon, pioneers in the Perlite Industry. Using old Alexite Ore from Rosita, Colorado, the company produced primarily concrete and plaster aggregate in rotary, horizontal furnaces.

The 1970's brought changes in processes, products, and proprietors; gone were the old horizontal furnaces, replaced by more efficient vertical furnaces. Concrete and plaster were gradually supplanted by block fill insulation, horticultural, and texture grades of perlite.


MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

This was a two room school house 1st through 4th in one room, 5th through 8th in the second. Coal fired stoves were used for heat, outhouses for bathrooms, and the porch was the storage room for children's lunches.

there was no running water, and plays and indoor activities were in the Community Building next door. The kids played Dare Base and Kick The Can during recess.

Teachers were Curtis and Haskins.

There were 3 or 4 students in each grade, one teacher to the 4 grades.

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Elk's Lodge No. 610

One of Cañon City's most imposing club houses or lodges is located at Fifth Street and Macon Avenue. Built in 1912, the Cañon City Elk's Lodge No. 610 has been the subject of many newspaper articles over the years.

The three-story, full-basement building cost \$60,000 to construct and contains a lodge room that was called "one of the most beautiful in the Rocky Mountain Region," according to newspaper articles.

The lodge room, which is located on the second floor, can hold more than 400 persons. Heavy, upholstered benches line three sides of the room and a balcony adds to the seating capacity, according to a 1912 newspaper article. The second floor also had a ladies' lounge, anteroom, small kitchen, store rooms and a private parlor used as a family room during Elks funeral services.

On the third floor is located more storage or committee rooms and the balcony overlooking the lodge room. The area over the lodge room reaches into the third floor.

The ground floor contained reading and social rooms furnished with leather-upholstered chairs and couches, reading tables and a large collection of newspapers and magazines. There also were several recreation rooms with card tables, snooker, billiard and pool tables, and bar, cigar and candy counters, the 1912 report stated.

In the basement was a modern kitchen and banquet hall designed to feed more than 250 persons. There were restrooms on every floor. Elk Lodge members could sit on swings or easy chairs in the west porch. There they could discuss local and national politics.

Elks Lodge No. 610 was formed in 1900 and was located in two local halls on Main Street until the members had the present lodge built at 404 Macon Avenue.



A PROUD HISTORY:

In 2000 a refurbishment was started that continues today. Also in 2000 the Lodge held it's 100th year celebration that was attended by numerous State and National dignitaries.
