

ACTIVITIES OF THE STAFF AT THE MUSEUM AND HISTORY CENTER

Now that the busy season is over at the History Center, staff has been working hard on a number of different projects. The digitization of the Abbey Films is now complete. The Friends of the Museum received a grant this fall from the Colorado Historical Records Advisory Board to preserve and digitize the twenty 16mm reel-to-reel films that showed the Holy Cross Abbey School and Camp Holy Cross during the 1940's through the 1950's. The project was completed a few weeks ago; the films offer some great insight into student life at the Abbey and the fun activities held at the Camp.

The History Center is also continuing to process the *Daily Record* Collection.

They recently received another large collection of records from the Cañon City Main Street Association, which contains promotional materials and results of downtown surveys. Finally, in December, staff at the History Center helped to open the time capsule which was interred in the cornerstone located on the Northeast corner of the Carnegie-wing of the Cañon City Public Library. The contents of the time capsule will be on display in the library at the grand reopening of the restored library.

Plans are being made to create a new exhibit that will go in the middle upstairs gallery. The new exhibit will replace the "Discover Downtown" display. Work will begin this winter and the new exhibit should be installed sometime before the summer season.

LIST OF DEAD AND MISSING IN SUNDAY'S RAILROAD WRECK

Denver, Aug. 9, 1904 - The Republican this morning says: At the hour of going to press seventy-four bodies had been recovered and identified and the closest estimate put the total death list at 106 from the wreck on Sunday night of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, near Eden station, seven miles north of Pueblo, making of it the greatest railroad disaster that Colorado has suffered and one of the most disastrous in the history of the country.

It will take days to determine the actual number of persons who perished. The wall of water that hurled itself upon the foremost part of the train as the latter was passing over a trestle that spammed the arroyos, carried the engine, baggage car, smoking car and chair car down to the creek as if they were pieces of float, and as the two cars, crowded with passengers, began to break the bodies were caught in the flood and carried to the Fountain river, which in turn empties into the Arkansas river, and search is being prosecuted in both rivers for the dead.

The train was cut in two. The two Pullman cars and dining car remained on the track, the coupling having given way as the smoking car plunged into the abyss, leaving the end of the nearest Pullman hanging four feet over the abyss.

Of the hundred or more people in the two cars that plunged into the torrent, but three escaped and their escape, as was that of the fireman on the engine, was miraculous to a degree. All the others in the cars were drowned. The three who escaped did so through the roof of the smoking car being battered in as the huge wall of water that fell from the skies a few miles nearer the foot hills tossed the cars hither and thither in what was a few minutes before a dry, sandy creek.

The monster engine was dragged by the water a considerable distance and one of the cars containing passengers was found almost a mile from the wreck, such was the tremendous force of the waterspout that went crashing down what was known as Dry creek.

The passengers had no warning. The pilot of the engine had almost reached the end of the light trestle that spans the hundred feet of arroyos, when the full force of the wave struck it and carried with it every part of the train that was then on the trestle into the seething tide, tossing the engine and cars and rolled the over and over in its fury.

Death to most of the passengers must have been sudden and in all probability painless. They were drowned. The bodies of those recovered show few bruises. But as the cars broke the dead bodies were carried on and often buried in the sand.

As the train was from Denver bound for the World's Fair at St. Louis, a number of Denver people were lost; but the heaviest burden of the disaster will fall on Pueblo. . . .

Our Tunnel Drive hiking trail was a grand scheme to bring water into the city from the Arkansas River and provide plenty of that precious commodity to all the citizens. This project was proposed in the early 20th century by the forward looking gentlemen who also built roads to Cripple Creek, railroads to Leadville, and other fantastic projects. The problem with this one was that it died in the middle, and all that is left are the wonderful tunnels of Tunnel Drive. As you can see, they actually got to the point of an "aqueduct" across that chasm on Fremont

Peak where the Tunnel Drive road begins. (Hot Springs Hotel in the background).
