#### **ROY AND LINDA ROPER - THE ROPER RANCH**

"Roy asserts they are not long-time residents in Fremont County, having lived here only 40 years, working with many farm and ranch people during my career with the Conservation Service. I actually did more of the conservation work after my retirement in 1958, such as help with strip-mine rehabilitation".

## THE GOODNIGHT BARN PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

The crowd was exceptionally well represented by the many students who worked on the project and were there to explain the intricacies of their creations. #### SYNOPSIS OF CHARLES GOODNIGHT/ROCK CANYON RANCH PRESENTATION AND SLIDE SHOW

The Presentation is an approximately 30-35 minute talk and slide show on the history of Charles Goodnight's life and his Rock Canyon Ranch in Pueblo, Colorado. Its main focus is on Western Heritage in Colorado and preservation of the same for our future generations.

Linda Crawford, Co-Chair of the Goodnight Barn Preservation Committee, uses the first half of the presentation to speak to Goodnight's early life, his arrival in Texas, his jobs as a youth and teen (including Indian Scout and Texas Ranger) that prepared him for his life-long work in the cattle trail and ranching business later in life. She also speaks to his early interest in Texas Longhorns, his partnership with Oliver Loving and the first cattle drives they did together.

# The local story of homesteading, ranching and building of the infrastructure of the agricultural part of Fremont County will be presented by <u>ROY ROPER</u>:

Roy Roper was born March 2, 1925 in a frame home two miles south of Goodpasture near Beulah. CO. His education consisted of attendance at a one-room school house at Cedar Grove from 1930 to 1939, Beulah School one year, (39-40), and graduated from Central High School, Pueblo, CO in 1942. He attended Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical College in Fort Collins (now Colorado State University) and graduated in 1950 with a B.S. degree in Agriculture.

Roy entered the U.S. Navy in 1943 and served through 1946, during WWII as an electrician on a Cruiser, USS Vincennes, serving in the South Pacific Theater. He worked as a District Conservationist for 33 years with the USDA Soil Conservation Service, rhen another 21 years in retirement work, with a final retirement in March of 2005.

He is married to Linda Roper. They had four children, 2 sons and 2 daughters. Roy enjoys several hobbies – mainly gardening, hunting, fishing, camping, genealogy, local history and writing his life history for his family.


