Edward Joseph Powers (aka Fast Eddie)

Born 1888 Chicago- Died 1933 Chicago

Fast Eddie Powers was an entrepreneur and businessman providing those goods and services that are deemed by the government as illegal. His motto is "Anything for a buck...but don't get in my way when I collect." He got his start as a kid 'rushing the growler' (getting a bucket of beer and food) for the meat cutters in the slaughterhouse works on the west side...he couldn't stand school and left when he completed 8th grade. In his teens he started 'running numbers' for the gamblers and worked his way into a life of crime. When the 'Great War' hit he was well established in the Northside mob working for Dini O'Banion and in 1920, when prohibition hit, he was well positioned to take over the "booze" operation. His insights into the folly of the temperance movement and the banning of alcohol provide an entertaining look at the Roaring 20's. There is more to the 18th Amendment than you think.

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PROSPECT HEIGHTS JAIL THE ANSWER TO PROHIBITION IN FREMONT COUNTY

The Prospect Heights Town was formed in 1905 by the people who lived along the blocks of South 4th Street. The majority of these folks were named Adamic, and until the day the town was dissolved, there was always at least one Adamic on the town board.

In 2000 the one remaining member of the Town Board, Ted Adamic, signed a quitclaim deed, giving the Prospect Heights Jail to the Fremont County Historical Society, and thus ended a 95 year tenure of this small town.

The Prospect Heights Mercantile Company was also a part of the landscape. It was a boarding house, grocery store, selling general merchandise and mining gear for the residents of the town. It is now an antique store, open most days.

The intent of the citizens of Prospect Heights was to serve their particular public - the working miners of the area. The two large mines and the two large smelters, also within walking distance of the South 4th Street location of Prospect Heights, was incentive to provide liquid refreshment to those who worked the 12-hour shifts at the mines and smelters. The railroad furnished shipping into the town by rail cars of booze.

When Cañon City voted "dry," it was the opportunity for this enterprising town to furnish the liquid refreshment for those who wished to climb 4th Street Hill.

The Jail was contracted to be built in 1906 to Ernest Sell and his father. The interior of the cells have not been touched, but left in the original condition. The distinctive features of these cells are the barrel ceilings and the "heater" built into the connecting wall. The door, window and ceiling all need to have major work done to restore them to original condition. We have asked those who visit, and they all say "Leave it the way it is, the historic look is perfect."


The barred outside door is strong and solid. Restoration of the foundation on the North side of the building is planned. Restoration work must comply with National Park Service standard. Documents outlining the necessary steps to follow are a result of the recent Historic Structure Assessment done by Preservation Studio, Inc. of Colorado Springs and Architechnology of the same office.

FCHS conducts open house every Saturday during the summer (no heat for winter hours). Many people passing by, stop because the door is open, and their comment "I always wanted to see inside this building," has been heard many times.

We can attest to a few ghosts that inhabit our wonderful little building, so if you are a ghost chaser, this is your cup of tea. Open House hours are from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturdays through September. There will be more scheduled late during the Fall Heritage Festival sponsored by the Society and the Fremont County Heritage Commission.

Built in 1906 by Fred Sell, the Prospect Heights Town Jail was used until 1914 to incarcerate unruly patrons of the 8 bars and saloons in the town of Prospect Heights.

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


