


HOW WOULD THEY SURVIVE? WORK ON THE RAILROAD? WORK IN THE MINES? WERE THEY TRICKED INTO COMING HERE? WERE THEY SWINDLED OUT OF THEIR MONEY? HOW WOULD THEY COMMUNICATE WITH THEIR ENGLISH-SPEAKING NEIGHBORS WHEN ALL THEY UNDERSTOOD WAS YIDDISH? WERE THEY ABANDONED BY THE HEBREW EMIGRANT AID SOCIETY THAT SPONSORED THEIR TRIP TO THE WEST?

THESE AND MORE QUESTIONS WILL BE ANSWERED BY JENNIFER MOORE LOWE WHO USES GENEALOGY, HISTORY, RESEARCH AND OTHER MEANS TO DIG DEEP INTO LOCAL RECORDS TO FIND THE ANSWERS AND TELL THE STORY OF WHAT REALLY HAPPENED IN COTOPAXI. SHE'S BEEN RESEARCHING THESE QUESTIONS FOR MORE THAN 10 YEARS AND HER PRESENTATIONS HAVE BEEN DESCRIBED AS LIVELY, ENTERTAINING, INFORMATIVE AND EDUCATIONAL.

IN THE END, YOU WILL SEE HOW THE COTOPAXI STORY KEPT MANY FAMILIES FROM THE HOLOCAUST AND WHY IT'S IMPORTANT TO RECORD THE ROAD-MARKS ALONG THE WAY SO THAT THE JOURNEY IS NEVER FORGOTTEN.

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THE "Doc" LITTLE AWARD STARTED IN 1986 FREMONT COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The "Doc" Little award is presented each year to a person who has made a significant contribution to the goals of the Fremont County Historical Society (formerly known as the Fremont /Custer Historical Society until 2006). It is named in memory of Wilbur T. Little, the long- time journalist in Cañon City. The "Doc" is because he succeeded his father as coroner in the mid 30's. His father was a medical doctor who practiced medicine in the Fremont County area for several years. "Doc" Little was instrumental in founding the Historical Society and served as its president. His son, Jim Little has carried on the journalist traditions by publishing the Wet Mountain Tribune and contributing to the Historical Society as well.

Each year a person is named from the community who has made a significant contribution to the mission of the Society - identify, educate and promote heritage sites and events throughout the County. We are awarding this prestigious designation to a gentleman from Western Fremont County who has worked throughout the county to further the goals of the Society. William (Bill) Schrader has been working for many years in the western part of the County to educate the people who are part of that area. He also contributed time, with his wife, to the Greenwood Cemetery Stone Reading Project, Roadside Interpretive Signs in 2002, and in 2004 completed the Pathway Into History Project which is informative kiosks along County Road 45 in the Howard-Wellsville area depicting the long history of that road to the silver mines in Leadville prior to highway and railroad construction.

Congratulations to a great job done in educating the public, conducting tours, supporting the Museum in Howard and resource material that is contained in it. Thank you, Bill.

YOUR SOCIETY IS ALWAYS INTERESTED IN AND BOOSTING LOCAL FOLKS MAKING OUR HISTORY MORE AVAILABLE TO THOSE WHO ARE SEEKING ANSWERS ABOUT THE HERITAGE OF FREMONT COUNTY: <u>CROSSROADS THROUGH TIME AT PCC CAMPUS.</u> The objective of this approximately 2,000- foot People and Places Interpretive Trail is to present the story of the people, places, activities and circumstances that have touched, and been touched by, the Fremont County Region. Waysides along the trail will include informative signs, artifacts, representations and art pieces. PCC students and community members are encouraged to participate in researching and organizing displays. The Fremont Campus Colorado History courses will use the People and Places Trail for learning purposes and will be involved in classes that include development of possible future displays, activities, and K-12 curriculum.

The first section of the trail "From the Early Coloradans" will include the Paleo-Indians, the Spanish and the French. Displays will include information from the end of the last Ice Age, the first people in the region, and the Spanish who traveled through the area. One display will be designed to enlighten visitors about the Spanish battle against Greenhorn that happened just south of the campus.

The Society will be supporting the placing of signs along this trail by a donation to the Crossroads Through Time Group.

TIME CAPSULE AT THE LIBRARY

The Cañon City Ladies Library Association organized in March of 1886. Their sole purpose was to start a public library. Following their first meeting, the Association began raising funds and collecting donated books. One member went door-to-door with a baby buggy, gathering donated books. In June 1886, they opened to the public. The library had a reading room and lending library of 200 donated books.

By 1901, the library contained 4,000 books. The Ladies Library Association decided a larger building was needed. The President of the Association wrote a letter to Andrew Carnegie. Carnegie, a Pittsburgh steel millionaire, had helped to establish numerous libraries around the nation. The Association purchased two lots on Macon Street for the site of a new library. The women also obtained a pledge to support the library from the City of Cañon City. Seeing the women's dedication, Carnegie donated a total of \$13,000 for the new library.

On July 4th, 1902, they laid the cornerstone of the Carnegie Public Library. Following speeches by various dignitaries, a box was placed in a receptacle of the cornerstone and sealed with cement.

In December of 1902, the Ladies moved into the new library building. There were approximately 4,500 volumes in the collection by that time. With the completion of the library, the work of the Cañon City Ladies Library Association was done. They turned the library over to the City of Cañon City at a dedication ceremony on January 5th, 1903. The Ladies held their last official meeting in April 1903.

On December 5.-2014, the time capsule the Cañon City Ladies Library Association had the foresight to have placed here 115 years ago was opened.

The time capsule was replaced with some modern- day items: cell phones, contemporary books, lists of people in office, etc.
