The Museum Has a New Sign

Driving across town via Highway 50 just got a little more interesting with the unveiling of a new sign at the Royal Gorge Regional Museum and History Center. The original brown street sign, placed by the highway department, directed residents and tourists to the museum for many years. That sign was removed when Big Al, our dinosaur, was installed on the northwest corner of the museum's property. It soon became apparent that a new permanent sign was needed when people came in to what they thought was still the Municipal Building to pay their water bills and as recently as last year to obtain a building permit. Because the building is on the National Register of Historic Places and the original brick was no longer available, the classic style of a monument-type sign was selected. Careful consideration was given to the placement of the sign to complement rather than take away from the building. Mike Madone and his team from Mountain Masonry prepared the foundation and completed the structural work on December 24th.

The Cañon City Daily Record and Our Fund Raising Need

In 2014, the Museum signed an agreement with Prairie Mountain Publishing Company to preserve and make accessible to the public the Cañon City Daily Record (CCDR) Collection. The collection consists of 283 bound volumes of the Cañon City Record and the CCDR from the years 1904-2010 along with thousands of newspaper clippings, copy prints or photo proofs, and several hundred 35 mm negatives and contact sheets.

Due to the enormous size of the CCDR Collection, the museum's small staff decided to phase the project of preservation, cataloging, and rehousing this collection.

The first phase of consolidating the museum's subject files and family files with the CCDR Collection of newspaper clippings to avoid excessive duplication was completed by our staff and volunteers.

The second phase for staff and museum volunteers has been to match the unidentified or undated copy prints and other photos with a dated newspaper article and a published photo to establish provenance. This phase of the project is nearly complete.

The third phase in the preservation of the CCDR Collection is the digitization, cataloging and rehousing of the entire collection of copy prints and 35mm filmstrips into the museum's collection. The chemicals used in processing the pictures over time have begun to off-gas and destroy the image making digitization of the collection critically important. Scanning the images in their current state is the best solution in preserving these images. In order to scan the collection, the museum needs to purchase a digital scanner solely dedicated to scanning the CCDR Collection.

Currently, the Royal Gorge Regional Museum & History Center does not have the budget for a scanner with the capacity to scan both positive and negative images or the necessary archival supplies to rehouse this collection. The digital scanner that is needed for the completion of this phase of the project costs \$3,750. This professional scanner has the capacity to scan photographic prints, negatives, and transparency slides up to 12" x 16.5" at or above the professional standards set for digital archiving purposes.

Museum staff and the Friends of the Museum are asking for your support to help fund this phase of the project. Any contributions you or your company can make towards funding this project would be greatly appreciated. These documents are a treasure trove of facts and fond memories which have tremendous historical and emotional significance to the residents both past and present of this community. The digitization and better storage will ensure that this irreplaceable collection is preserved and accessible for future generations of museum patrons.

Liquid Gold

The annual meeting of the Friends of the Museum and History Center was held on February 2nd at the Royal Gorge Regional Museum and History Center. Gerrie Colette, chair of the Friends of the Museum, conducted a short business meeting and introduced board members. Paula McFarland gave a treasurer's report and Lisa Studts, Director of the Museum, distributed a survey requesting input for the museum's strategic planning. Anne Zielinski and Terri Meeks were nominated and elected to serve on the board for two year terms. Gerrie concluded the meeting by giving a brief history of the four water systems in Fremont County: Florence Regional Water Authority, Penrose, Park Center and Canon City Water Districts.

Brandon Harris, Ron Gasser, James Wade, and Bob Hartzman were invited to represent their respective water districts. Regrettably Ron Gasser and James Wade had previous commitments. Brandon Harris and Bob Hartzman presented fascinating facts about each of their water systems. While all districts get their water in some way from the Arkansas River, each man discussed the water rights, gravity flow, treatment, storage, pumping and distribution requirements for their facilities. In terms of treatment, impurities in the Florence water system rise to the service while those in Canon City are exactly the opposite, sinking to the bottom. The men outlined the improvements and expansion made throughout the years. The shear number of gallons per day processed through each facility was astounding only emphasizing that water is indeed liquid gold.


2018Accomplishments
