THE CHARCOAL KILNS AT COALDALE IN THE LATE 1800'S AND EARLY 1900'S BUILT BY HARP AND MANNED BY SAWYERS, BURNERS, AND 24 HOURS A DAY: DAY LABORERS WHO LOADED IT OUT AND PUT CHARCOAL IN WAGONS TO BE TAKEN TO THE RAILROAD A QUARTER MILE AWAY.

The stories that were told and the large number of tons of blocks of stone that were mined and quarried out of the mountains in Western Fremont County is a tale of economic and social adjustment for many of these farming communities. We will hear the story of the struggles and triumphs of these pioneers and their descendents.

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HOWARD KILNS




The kilns at Howard which were positioned next to the railroad tracks. These kilns burned night and day for many years.

They were bulldozed by the railroad for "safety reasons" in the late 1950's, but this picture, taken by Mable Kneivel, has survived to show us how they looked when in use.

THE PRISONERS AT THE STATE PENITENTIARY BUILT THE MASSIVE WALLS AND BUILDINGS FROM THEIR QUARRY.

The granite quarrry, south of Cotopaxi, owned by different people at different times was a major contributor to the State Office Building - Civic Center Historic District In Denver, Co The granite was quarried at the site in large blocks, and shipped to the stone dressing warehouse in Denver where it was dressed, polished and cut to size. The total weight of granite used in the building was 45,469 cubic feet.

The total cost of the building in 1921 was \$1,494,375.




