#### **Community Coffee and Conversation**

Mining, recreation on the river and movies are just a few of the topics discussed during this summer's coffees. Folks involved in the local mining industry, descendants of miners, residents from mining areas and those interested in learning about local history all contributed to the discussion in June. Construction of the riverwalk, clean-up along the river and the adventures and misadventures of youth were brought to light in July. Fishing, tubing, kayaking, swinging from ropes dangling from cottonwood trees and something called "scurfing" were just some of the antics recounted by attendees. And Steve Smith regaled us with stories about the start of Buckskin Joe, how the 75 buildings were chosen, their design and construction and the flourishing of the movie industry and tourism there. #### **Dinosaurs and More**

A huge crowd turned out on Thursday, June 16 to hear Joshua Broussard and Jessica Wortman present a children's learning program at the Library. They gave some history of the Western Interior Seaway, talked about the fossils along Skyline Drive and brought along examples for the children to handle and examine. Joshua showed a paleontologist's tool kit and told the function of the loop, rock hammer, field notebook, maps, collecting bag, markers, and scale bar. Each child received pictures, an activity book and simulated rocks that they could dig for treasure.



#### **Draper Ranch Tour**

A caravan of folks arrived at "The Barn" at the Draper Ranch on Saturday, July 23. And oh, what a welcome!



Constructed at the beginning of the last century as a feeding operation, the barn features two silos, a



crenelated tower where the horse trainers lived, and an expanse of hundreds of feet of concrete with 20 entrances.

Jerry and Buddy

Draper ushered us into one of the areas to see 16 assorted wagons that had been used in some of the westerns filmed in the local area in the 1950s-1970s. Jerry told us about the 5000 acres of land that they manage locally as well as the cattle operations that their extended family run in adjacent communities. She explained the significance of the four brands each representing a branch of the family. Did you know that ranchers in the 21st century sell their cattle online?





Jerry pointed out the construction techniques used in building the barn. And back at the house in the shade of some large trees and tents, Jerry recounted the history of the ranch land, the five generations of the Draper family, and some of the stories about the Draper Cave. It was a fabulous adventure into the history of the area. Our many thanks to Jerry and Buddy for their hospitality.

#### Gerrie's Chocolate Crunch Brownies

Several of the folks visiting the Draper Ranch requested the recipe for Gerrie's Chocolate Crunch Brownies. Gerrie is graciously sharing the recipe for others to enjoy.

1 c. softened butter 1 c. all-purpose flour 1 jar (7 oz) marshmallow creme

1 c. sugar 2 tsp vanilla extract 1 c. creamy peanut butter


4 eggs 1/2 tsp. salt 3 c. crisp rice cereal

6 tbsp baking cocoa 3 c. semisweet chocolate chips

In large bowl, cream butter, sugar, and 1 egg at a time. Stir in cocoa, flour, vanilla, and salt. Spread into greased 13 x 9 x 2 inch baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until brownies test done. Cool overnight. Next day, spread marshmallow creme over brownies. Best to chill overnight. In a small saucepan, melt peanut butter and chips over low heat. Remove from heat; stir in cereal and spread over marshmallow layer. Chill in refrigerator. Happy cooking!
