OUR INFAMOUS HISTORY:

Lynching describes the physical act of hanging, stringing someone up without expedient formalities. In principle lynching means a death sentence without recourse to due justice. Out West, lynchings were rough and ready -Colorado pioneers were quick to see justice done without preliminary due process. One western memoir recounts that lynch law was necessary to keep peace.


MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

STONES 'N BONES

Fremont County Stones 'n Bones has spread the joy of geology and paleontology around town. At the Aspen Leaf Bakery in Florence is Steve Wolfe's exhibit on many familiar minerals and their uses. Take a look at what magnetite does to a compass, enjoy stunning black mica and white mica specimens, and check out the brilliantly-colored copper ores.

At RSVP in Canon City are local Fremont County fossil collections from Tepee Buttes and Indian Springs, plus a myriad of fossils including a trilobite, shark tooth, palm leaf, clam, and ammonites. New at the Kitchen Pantry is Steve Wolfe's heart rock collection.

Coming soon will be Fluorescent Rocks under Short Wave Light at BLM and a Then and Now Coal Mining Gear display complete with a theropod dinosaur track from the Dorchester Mine ceiling.

A letter from one of our former citizens of the County – and in remembrance of that lady, here is the letter sent to us with the very generous donation of \$500.00: This letter was dated December 13, 2013:

"This December 31, (2013) will be the 100th anniversary of my mother's birth. Born Elizabeth Arbuckle Miller in Cañon City to Julia and Edward Miller, she lived on my grandparent's farm in the Four Mile area. She went to Four Mile School and graduated from Cañon City high School. My mother's elder sisters had been born in Cripple Creek but both also attended Cañon City high School.

I grew up in Pueblo but spent plenty of time in Cañon City until the farm was sold and my grandmother moved in with us in Pueblo. I have many happy memories of visiting the Royal Gorge, being on the Arkansas River, and eating at Merlino's. Both of my grandparents are buried in Lakeside Cemetery.
