100 years of Field Camp in Cañon City.

Field Geology or as it is commonly called **Field Camp** is the capstone course of most Geology degree programs. It is the class where students are able to take all of the information and skills they have acquired in their other geology

classes and use them to understand rocks in the field. The work involves understanding how sediments are deposited to become rocks, how igneous rocks flow and intrude into

the crust, and how metamorphic rocks are made from igneous and sedimentary rocks by deformation and the addition of heat. The processes leave a decipherable record in the rocks and can be investigated by geologists. Colorado offers venues with excellent exposure to study these geologic materials and processes.


The University of Kansas has been teaching our course in Field Geology in the Cañon City area for the last 100 years.



The Field Geology course has focused on the Garden Park area north of Cañon City along with field exercises done over the entire surrounding area. In 1940, the current permanent camp was established just south of the entrance to Shelf Road when cabins were built for staff and students, and a small meeting hall was constructed. The camp was on property leased from the Dilley family and ran successfully for decades. In the late 1990s, the Dilley family sold their property, and donors to the KU Geology endowment funds purchased the 35-acre lot where the camp is based. Since that time, the KU Field Camp has been a fixture of the Dilley Ranch development area. KU further solidified its position in the area in 2018 by purchasing a section of land in the mountain's northwest of Cañon City. This area, referred to as Blue Ridge, is underlain by world-class exposures of metamorphic rocks showing the structures associated with their

development. Again, this was supported by the generous

contribution of the KU alumni.



Robert P. Harrison

In 2022, the Department of Geology and our alumni celebrated 100 years of Field Camp in Cañon City. We held a 3-day celebration at the camp and in town to recognize the myriad of geologists who have taken the course. At the same time, Beth Harrison announced a generous gift in honor of Robert P. Harrison, a former geology student, a very successful businessman, and her father-in-law, to help fund the camp into the future. Harrison was a 1938 graduate of the University of Kansas in Geology. The camp has been now

named the Robert P. Harrison Field Station. We feel now that the camp will be able to start its next 100 years with the support it needs for continued excellence in teaching Field Geology.

Founded in 1971 by a consortium of interested persons from Fremont and Custer Counties. There were 200 original charter members, and the name was Fremont-Custer Historical Society. The name was changed to Fremont County Historical Society in 2012. The focus of the Society is to facilitate researching, interpreting, and preserving local history, materials, and sites. The Society has worked to place various locations on Colorado and National Registers of historic buildings throughout the County. Present Society projects include the Prospect Heights Jail preservation and restoration. The Society is cooperating with the Fremont County Heritage Commission in initiating the Local Landmark Designation for deserving properties throughout the County. The Society is also responsible for reprinting and selling the Self-Guided Tour booklets generated by the Heritage Commission. Support for the Geology Club and Stones 'n Bones Club is also continuing, as well as for the Florence Historic Archives, Inc.

The Society is authorized to have 12 members on its Board of Directors; currently we have 9. Our Board meetings are held the second Monday of each month (1 PM) at the Steeple Event Center and are open to the public. We encourage anyone interested to attend or become a board member.






Access Sundays at the History Center in Howard began on April 24th and will continue on the last Sunday of the month through October unless there are scheduling conflicts.


