Plant of Colorado Portland Cement Co.

Portland—A Company Town

In 1869, Charles Boettcher made his way from Germany to America. Along the way, he became interested in cement and saw cement as a building block for the future of business. He realized it would be needed in many phases of construction in the "fast growing West": foundations, buildings, housing, bridges and factories. Boettcher acquired his first cement plant at Portland Colorado in 1899. He made Portland so successful, Charles was able to buy more plants like it.

In the early 1900's, company houses and a brick schoolhouse were surveyed and platted out by A. B. McFall. Fourteen lots, 75' by 150', were planned for housing. The plat was filed in September 7, 1901 to begin a new town and plant.

In 1902, Portland Village was started. On the south side of the plant was a company

company doctor and served as post master until 1952, when the Portland company closed the post office.

By 1920, Portland could hold its own as a small company town. It had: 120 homes that rented for \$15-\$18 a month, Wilber's General Store, T. A. Davis Pharmacy, a pool hall, a theater that could put on movies or live stage plays, a post office, boarding houses, and the D & RG had passenger trains stop at the Portland Depot.

The flood of 1921 devastated Portland. Up in the mountains, Skagway Dam could not hold the water from a sudden cloudburst. The water overflowed the dam's spill way and followed 8 Mile Creek into Florence, Penrose and Portland and on into Pueblo. Flood waters took out buildings, homes, bridges, and railroad tracks in Portland. A second flood in June of 1921 from the Arkansas River delayed repairs to the plant.

The name has changed over the years: Portland, Ideal Cement, Ideal Basics, Holnam Inc., Holcim Inc., LaFarge/Holcim, and today in 2022: Holcim.


