Victoria Miller: "16 Tons: The Colorado Fuel and Iron Company Mines"

Lesser known than the gold and silver mines found throughout the American West, Southern Colorado's extensive coal mines fueled the engines of western industrialization in the late 19th and 20th centuries. Of the numerous companies operating at the time, none was larger than the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company (CF&I). This presentation will focus on the working and social lives of these adaptable and resilient workers in CF&I's southern Colorado mining communities, with special emphasis on CF&I's Fremont County mines.



Victoria Miller is a Pueblo native and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from Colorado State University-Pueblo and a Master of Arts degree in museum science from Texas Tech University. With more than 25 years of museum related experience, she has held positions in various museums emphasizing in collections management, museum education, exhibit design and interpretation, and museum management. In addition to her Steelworks Museum duties, she is also a certified archivist accredited by the Academy of Certified Archivists and is responsible for the acquisition, arrangement and description, preservation and access to the holdings within the Steelworks Archives.



Oak Creek Grade Cemetery

Recently the FCHS Board of Directors took a field trip to the Oak Creek Grade Cemetery to see what we could see. As most of you know FCHS is the proud owner of the cemetery and therefore the keepers of the land. The land was donated to the society in 2000 by George Papps, who acquired the property in a tax lien sale. The deed states there are 22 grave sites on the 1 ½ acre lot but the challenge has been identifying who is actually buried there and what the actual name of the cemetery was.

Names that have popped up for the cemetery have been Galena, Yorkville, Ilse, Toplip Family and the Oak Creek Grade Cemetery. Several years age interviews were conducted with some local residents and nobody could tell us the actual name but all agreed it is a very old cemetery.

Some remember wooden markers and wooden fences marking several graves. All these markers have gone away either from decay or used for firewood.

Although many of the residents of the cemetery are very timid to the point of not revealing their identity, one stands out! That is Bessie Rhodes, aged 9 months, 1885. Yes, this is the only resident identified by a marker. There is one other marker with the date 1892 etched in red stone that is legible. This stone is surrounded by the remails of a wood picket fence.

One news article dated November 1900 stated "Chas. Rand of Querita buried on of his children at Galena on the 28th. The little one died the previous day on Membranous Croup." Could this have been one of the last buried in "Our" cemetery?

According to school census records, District 19, there were Rant children going to school at Yorkville, Oak Creek, 1888 to 1891. Other names on the school records were: Toplip, Griffin, Rants, Hill, Stultz, Daniels, and Starr. The 1885 Colorado census for the area mentioned a family named A.J. Rhodes, wife Josephine, children Henry, Perry, and Mary. Maybe Bessie's family??

The cemetery is in pretty good shape for its age. There is a new sign our front and a new fence going in along the property line. We encourage you to visit and pay your respects to those that call this their final resting place.




