their custom line of wood shoes. Finally, Carri finished the tour in the farrier classroom barn and we got to watch students from across the nation learn horseshoeing skills. Between the different buildings at the facility, we donned our solar eclipse glasses, observing the progress of an eclipse occurring at the same time of the tour.

Greenwood Cemetery Tour

In cooperation with the Greenwood Cemetery Committee, the RGRMHC hosted a walking tour of the Greenwood Cemetery on October 14th.

Jessica Ashton shared with us that the Greenwood Cemetery, sometimes called "the Pioneer Cemetery," was the first official burial ground in Cañon City and that it is the final resting place for a wide variety of our earliest citizens; politicians, farmers, religious leaders, miners, businessmen, homemakers and children, fraternal organization members and DOC inmates. The original land was donated by William C. Caitlin and the grounds were expanded over time.

Kathy Uhland, of the Greenwood Cemetery Committee, expertly led the tour around the cemetery sharing along the way many stories of the lives, and deaths, of the interesting people laid to rest here. Kathy also gave us insight into the



unique challenges faced when caring for a "natural" dry landscape cemetery such as this.
