Annual Meeting

Friends member, museum volunteer and retired history teacher Mark Van Rhyn will present his program "From Bone to Bullets" on **Saturday, February 1st at 1:00 p.m**.

The program is designed as a hands-on interactive presentation to encourage audience participation. It will focus on a display of the evolution of weapons technology in Southern Colorado from about 1600 to 1875, with an emphasis on weapons as tools rather than as implements of mass destruction. We will use examples, discussion, and audience assistance to describe how these tools changed life around the Royal Gorge area. The "hands on" element will allow the audience to physically handle these tools, to give a different interpretation of what they did, how they worked, and their strengths and weaknesses.

The program will focus on three time frames beginning with the First Nations peoples. Examples of "stone age" technology will include the lance and the bow and arrow, with several projectile points (some prehistoric) to show the variety of this essential hunting tool, followed by an examination of knives with different blades, from bone to obsidian. Finally a brief look at ancient trade routes and the impact of the red Pipestone materials.

The second segment will begin with the initial European contact and the impact of new tools on the West. The arrival of what Jared Diamond called "guns, germs, steel" caused rapid massive change for the indigenous people and dramatically affected both the animal population and the biota. Central to this notion was the introduction of metal, especially iron implements such as knives, pots, and pans. Finally the introduction of firearms: first flintlock muskets, then cap and ball weapons, irrevocably stamped a permanent

The final portion of the program will focus on the Civil War Era and the "Wild West". This will concentrate on the transition from single shot muzzle loading weapons to breech loaders, then into repeating weapons such as magazine rifles and revolver pistols that are the essence of the Hollywood image of the American West.

brother, played by John Casavetes, is taking up the gunfighter life where he has left off. Threatened with losing his own land, he makes every attempt to rein in the young man but alas to no avail.

Community Coffee & Conversation

The museum sponsored a series of weekly coffees during the month of October focused on recreation in the area. The topics were biking, river sports, hiking and climbing, culminating on October 16 with hunting and fishing. Enthusiasts from the community joined the round table to discuss some historical aspects, memories and current plans for each topic.

Ending out the month, Glenn Norberg led a discussion about "curious encounters". Having read an article in the local newspaper about a sighting on Main Street in Florence, he became interested in the topic. He has since spent many hours photographing images and recording sounds that cannot be explained as well as





interviewing people about their experiences. He explained the signs to look for, many of which are unexplained except for a possible

sasquatch. He brought two foot castings and passed them around for everyone to examine. Participants shared their beliefs and a few doubts about such encounters and some even recounted personal experiences.

Italian heritage was the topic of November 20th conversation and while several attendees had no Italian connection, the discussion was lively. Why they immigrated, the towns they came from, the landing ports, mining, farming and orchards, family values and religion were all part of the interchange of information. The smell of Vezzetti's freshly baked

permeated the air around Coaldale was a particularly fond memory among long-time residents. Discrimination also existed; Cañon City passed a law in 1902 outlawing carrying a lunch pail down Main Street. I wonder if that's still on the books?

It is Rocket Science!

And boy is it fun! The museum paired with the Cañon City Public Library on Friday, November 22 to host Estes for a lesson on rockets, assembling a rocket and launching a rocket. Everyone met at the Rotary Pavilion in Centennial Park where Bella Power from Estes led five groups of 9-13 year olds through the various types of rockets, the parts composing the rockets, and step-by-step instructions to build their rockets. Each group had the opportunity to form a human rocket to demonstrate how each of the major parts works during a launch. After a short safety briefing, it was time to launch.

Of the 1754 visitors who came to tour the facility, 1173 were from outside our area so our "fame" is far-reaching. The museum offered programs for adults and children both in-house and through outreach programs. 2228 people participated in these programs. The museum also hosted 102 meetings.
